On Advent and the Wreath

Advent is the beginning of the church year, starting with the fourth Sunday before Christmas and continuing through the day before Christmas. The name is derived from a Latin word for "coming." The season is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of Jesus' birth, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and glory." So, during Advent, we are called to ponder the meaning of both the 1st and 2nd coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and to consider what it means for our lives.

We are all familiar with the Advent wreath, a circle often of greenery, marked by four candles that represent the four Sundays of the season of Advent. A candle is lit as each Sunday is celebrated in Advent.

Advent wreaths are used both in churches and in homes for devotional purposes. The candles may be blue, purple, or lavender, depending on local custom. We at St. Patrick's use three purple and a pink candle. The pink candle is lit on the third Sunday in Advent. Also at St. Patrick's, we include a white candle in the center known as the "Christ Candle," symbolizing the light of Christ that has come into the world. The Christ Candle is lit on Christmas Eve.

The four candles are said to symbolize the Christian ideals hope, love, joy and peace. In researching, we could not find a reliable Episcopal church source that identified which Sunday in Advent corresponds to which symbol. That's something to work on.
